Dear Everybody Wins DC Supporters and Friends,

This year has been a monumental one for Everybody Wins DC. We celebrated our 25th anniversary of serving children, families, and communities through shared reading. Over 1,100 students across the region participated in our programs. More than 1,000 caring adults volunteered their time to support our mission. We hosted almost 6,000 one-on-one Power Lunch mentoring sessions. And EWDC welcomed more than 80 new organizations to our volunteer efforts, expanding our network to 177 community partners.

These are just a few of the amazing milestones EWDC celebrated during the 2019-2020 program year. Even more fill the pages of this annual Shared Reading report. Thank you for being part of an inspiring network of friends and supporters who made these accomplishments possible.

At the same time, this year also presented new and unprecedented challenges. Covid-19 forced EWDC to adjust and adapt, finding innovative ways to keep reading pairs connected. Our new Power Lunch Pen Pal program shared almost 200 letters between mentors and students. We hand-delivered more than 600 books to families across the city. We are incredibly proud of how our students, school communities, and partner organizations have responded to this unparalleled crisis with resilience, kindness, and perseverance- all virtues we aspire to here at EWDC.

Looking ahead, we know that children will face significant challenges as they transition back to the classroom after months of distance learning and social isolation. Our students will need us more than ever. That's why we're going to do more than ever. EWDC's programs might look a little different next year, but our mission remains the same – **helping children thrive by building connections through reading.**

Thank you for a wonderful first 25 years. We look forward to the next 25, filled with amazing students, incredible partners, and plenty of good books.

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For 25 years, Everybody Wins DC has been guided by a simple yet powerful belief: sharing a book with a child can improve that child's life.

EWDC History

EWDC was founded in March 1995, when Senator James Jeffords (R-VT; left) and Senator Paul Simon (D-IL) brought together a bipartisan coalition of Senators and Senate staff to launch a reading-based mentoring program – Power Lunch – at Brent Elementary School.

Modeled after a similar program started a few years earlier in New York City, Senators Jeffords and Simon saw Power Lunch as a meaningful way to support students attending a public elementary school just a few blocks from the Capitol Building.

Now 25 years later, has made a lasting impact on a generation of students and volunteers. This year alone, EWDC has brought three shared reading programs to over 1,000 students across the Washington, DC region.





Power Lunch is EWDC's one-on-one mentoring program, connecting volunteers from the community with students in need to read together.

No lesson plans, no curriculum. Just quality time spent together over a book.

Students voluntarily give up a one hour lunch and recess period a week to read with their mentors, building an incredible connection that helps develop literacy skills, supports socialemotional development, and instills a love of reading and learning. In March 2020, EWDC made the voluntary decision to close shared reading programs for the remainder of the year due to Covid-19. This action pre-dated school closures and the shift to distance learning. The Year in Review reflects October 2019 - March 2020 programming.

At the time of closure, Power Lunch was on track to complete 8,000+ mentoring hours by May 2020.

The Book Project



Instilling the joy of reading, one book at a time.

During SY2019-2020, The Book Project hosted monthly distribution events for all Power Lunch students at each of our 12 partner schools. In addition, EWDC hosted 11 special distribution events at schools and in the community. Together, these events help students build their personal libraries and create opportunities to read outside of a school setting. The Book Project gives students the power to choose books that inspire and excite them, making it significantly more likely that they will read, share, and enjoy their selections.

The program only gives away new books and is supported through generous donations from individuals and partner organizations.

BlackRock Goes Big for the Holidays

Global investment management corporation and Power Lunch partner at Thomson Elementary, BlackRock helped EWDC celebrate our 25th anniversary in a major way.

From September to December 2019, BlackRock hosted a large-scale book drive competition across its US offices to support book distributions for students in the Power Lunch program and in high need communities.

BlackRock and EWDC set an ambitious goal to collect 3,500 books by the end of the competition. In the first month, BlackRock exceeded the initial goal with 4,000+ books donated - but they didn't stop there!

By November 2019, BlackRock team members had donated close to 7,000 books, nearly doubling the initial goal. In addition, BlackRock donated new backpacks, school supplies, and other reading materials to distribute to Power Lunch students.

On Giving Tuesday (12/03/19), more than 450 employees from BlackRock's regional offices attended the organization's annual U.S. Wealth Advisory National Sales Workshop in Washington, DC. During the Workshop, BlackRock employees took part in a 2-hour volunteer activity with EWDC, using the donated books to create personalized backpacks filled with books, supplies, and other resources for every single enrolled **and** waitlist Power Lunch student.

After the event, BlackRock team members helped deliver the personalized backpacks to each of EWDC's 12 partner schools for students to enjoy throughout the holiday break.

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New Beginnings at Walker-Jones

During the 2018-2019 school year, EWDC teased a big surprise to celebrate its 25th anniversary. Throughout the summer, supporters made numerous guesses, but all had to wait until the fall for the big reveal: **EWDC was expanding to a 12th school for the 2019-2020 program year.**

After a few years away, EWDC announced it was bringing its shared reading programs back to the Walker-Jones Education Campus in Washington, DC.

In celebration of the new school partnership, EWDC held a program kickoff with Power Lunch partners, community supporters, and students in the new reading space.

The new reading space – decorated by EWDC staff and Power Lunch partners – was unveiled with a "tiny scissors" ribbon cutting by WJEC students, EWDC Executive Director Jordi Hutchinson, Volunteer and Partnerships Manager Sarah Aldridge, Board member Mark D. Young, and Board Chair Arielle Elliott.

Students were then delighted by a StoryTime reading with Power Lunch partners American Petroleum Institute and Optum/The Advisory Board. The readers took turns reading "The Magician's Hat" by Malcolm Mitchell, philanthropist and former New England Patriot.

Following the magical reading, the kickoff concluded with students selecting brand new books - donated to the program by our new partners - to add to their personal libraries, as part of EWDC's Book Project.

On March 10, 2020, EWDC made a difficult yet necessary decision: In light of growing concerns over Covid-19, EWDC halted all in-person program activities. This included cancelling all Power Lunch reading sessions for the remainder of the 2019-2020 program year.

While it was disappointing to not complete a full year of shared reading, the health and safety of EWDC's students, volunteers, and school communities was paramount. At the same time, with schools closed and students learning from home, this was exactly the time when EWDC students needed support the most.

To support students and communities during this incredibly challenging time, **EWDC launched 3 new programs to bring the power of shared reading directly to children and families while they were safely at home**: Power Lunch Pen Pals, an online Shared Reading Library, and a community distribution program within The Book Project.




EWDC Revives the Lost Art of Letter Writing



Power Lunch is more than just a mentor and student reading together; it is about building consistent, supportive relationships that set students up for success.

To ensure students could still lean on and learn from their mentors while at home, EWDC created Power Lunch Pen Pals to keep reading pairs connected via letters, emails, pictures, and more.

Through Pen Pals, students talked about what they were reading, how they were feeling, or whatever else was on their minds. Students and mentors were not able to share a book in person, but they were able to maintain a strong connection, something critically important during social distancing.



Shared Reading Library

Stories On-Demand for the Whole Family to Enjoy



While Covid-19 required EWDC to cancel in-person StoryTime events, read-aloud opportunities still provided students significant benefits while learning from home. That's why EWDC launched a new virtual Shared Reading Library, bringing read alouds directly into the homes of students and their families.

EWDC's Shared Reading Library was filled with videos of EWDC volunteers and supporters reading books and modeling shared reading discussions, offering a convenient option for families who wanted additional reading-based activities and supports from a trusted partner.

The program also provided a critical literacy lifeline for many families while schools, libraries, and bookstores were closed due to the public health emergency.

Community Book Distributions

Bringing Shared Reading to Communities in Need



When Covid-19 forced schools, libraries, and bookstores to close, many students were cut off from access to engaging, age-appropriate reading materials. EWDC stepped in to fill this gap, launching a community distribution program that extended The Book Project to neighborhoods hardest hit by the pandemic.

With the help of community partners, EWDC mobilized to hand-deliver free books and literacy resources right to families' front doors. One distribution – a partnership with the Mount Vernon Triangle Community Improvement District – brought over 650 books to families living within the Walker-Jones school community, including at the District's only intergenerational housing community, Plaza West.

Plaza West families, led by grandparents, faced unique, significant challenges amidst school closures and social distancing. EWDC and MVTCID worked together to assess families' literacy needs, create customized book packages for delivery, and bring them directly to families' homes.
